



Selected 2011 Census data on cultural and linguistic diversity in WA

Broomehill-Tambellup Local Government Area

According to the 2011 Census, the Broomehill-Tambellup LGA has a total population of **1,139** people:

- 9.7% were born overseas
- approximately 2.7% were born in a non-main English speaking (NMES) country
- 3.8% speak a language other than English at home.
