| Abigail Mama's Inc | \$30,000 | African-Women Sewing Program — This project will run a series of sewing and alteration classes at the Herb Graham Recreation Centre Mirrabooka and the African Centre in Nollamara. The aim of the program is to upskill the women in the community and offer them employable skills to make a living. The final stage of the program is to rent a kiosk for a month at Mirrabooka Shopping Centre, where women will run a temporary clothing alteration business, as well as sell handmade clothing. | Strategic Projects |
| Abigail Mama's Inc | \$50,000 | African-Women Sewing Program (ASP) — This program focuses on providing sewing skills and resources for at least 25 migrant African women with the aim to empower the participants with tangible skills to earn an income as well as provide basic business and conversational English skills. This program is a second iteration of the program delivered in 2021 and will offer increased participation and multiple skill level modules. At the end of the program Abigail Mamas will arrange a work placement for the participants in a workshop space managed and supported by the organisation. | Strategic Projects |
| Al Noor Community Language Inc | \$5000 | Al Noor Multicultural Community — The organisation will host weekly community gatherings on Fridays at Charlottes Vineyard Community Centre in Ellenbrook. These gatherings will include interactive activities for young children, as well as sessions for parents focusing on skills development, employment, Australian law and culture, and mental health support. They will also host sessions for young women, inviting guest speakers to inspire and provide confidence to the women in their community. | Community Capacity Building |

ASeTTS has delivered five iterations of this program and has amassed an alumni of over 100 community leaders. Through recent evaluation and a review process it has been identified that these past participants will benefit from additional support to further their professional development in the leadership space. The funding will be used to support two community development officers, a project officer and support staff over 24 months to deliver four masterclasses, two networking events and facilitate mentoring support for 40 participants and 20 volunteers. | Strategic Projects |
| Association of Bhutanese in Perth Inc | \$5,000 | Consultation and Strategic Planning — This project will organise a series of focus group discussions involving parents, children and young adults aged 5-25, from the Bhutanese community to identify emerging needs and concerns across each cohort. The outcomes of this consultation will be used to plan the organisation's community strategies for the next two to five years. The discussions will be hosted alongside major Bhutanese community events in February and April 2022 expected to be attended by hundreds of community members. | Australian Arab Association Inc | \$10,000 | Arab Festival 2022 — This free family-friendly festival to be held on 19 March at Burswood Park aims to display and celebrate the vibrant cultures and traditions of the 22 Arab nations. The festival will include rides and games for children and young people, stalls and activities showcasing Arabic food and culture, and a program of culturally diverse stage performances. The event will be delivered by 93 volunteers, involves 55 participating groups and is expected to be attended by at least 22,167 people from the Arab and broader community. | Festivals |

Driver theory classes and driving lessons taught by professional and multilingual female instructors from a CaLD background will be offered with the aim of each participant gaining their driving license. The program will engage at least 30 women predominately from Iraq, Iran, Eritrea, Afghanistan, Myanmar, Somalia, Sri Lanka and the Philippines. | Strategic Projects |
| Bona Pasogit Perth Inc | \$5,000 | Batak Night 2022 — This free community festival aims to showcase and promote Batak Culture to the broader community in the Perth Metropolitan area as well as bring together the members of the Batak community in WA and provide an opportunity to connect to their culture. The festival will feature cultural performances through song, dance and a fashion show as well as a presentation of traditional food. The event will be held at The Rocks in Cannington on Saturday 17 September and aims to attract up to 400 attendees with 10 volunteers supporting the event. | Festivals |

The organisation's committee and membership comprises people predominately of Indian heritage, and it is known to deliver Indian cultural celebrations within the Byford area. This annual festival showcases the different cultures of the community residing in the Byford area. The event will be held on 5 February and will feature a program of dance and singing stage performances, stalls for food and craft, and displays for local cultural associations and clubs. | Centre for Asylum Seekers, Refugees and Detainees | \$100,000 | Developing Disaster Resilience — CARAD will work with 150 community members from an asylum-seeking background to co-design educational materials and workshops that build awareness and understanding of response needs to emergency and disaster situations in a Western Australian context. The project content will have a particular focus on the COVID-19 pandemic, fires, and floods. With the increase of COVID-19 in the community, as well as the incidences of extreme weather events, there is an urgency for people seeking asylum to be well informed and equipped to prepare, respond, and recover when impacted by these events. The project will be delivered in three stages: Define: consultation to gain an informed understanding of awareness of emergencies. Design: Co-design with targeted CaLD communities to identify and develop culturally and linguistically appropriate resources to improve emergency and disaster awareness, response preparation and recovery pathways. Deliver: Information, resources, contacts and educate people seeking asylum in WA. The funding will support a project officer and at least four community consultants as well as the development of educational resources and translation services for the 12-month duration of the project. | Strategic Projects |
| Chin Community of Western Australia | \$5,000 | Chin Community Sport Tournament 2022 — The Chin Community of WA will host three full days of outdoor sporting events alongside a program of cultural and family activities. The activity will be held in Koondoola Park during school holidays in January and February 2022 and is expected to engage at least 230 participants and 700 spectators. The activity aims to create awareness about the importance of a physically active and healthy lifestyle, and bring together members of the Chin community who live both north and south of the river to network and socialise in a family-friendly and culturally appropriate environment. | Community Capacity Building |

The sessions will be held over one day at the Hamersley Leisure Centre, with one targeted for primary school aged children and the other targeting teenagers and adults. Various CaLD communities have committed to participate in the event including broader Indian groups and representatives from Sri Lankan, Chinese, Indonesian, Japanese, Afghani and Cook Island communities. While membership and activities are open to women from all CaLD backgrounds, about 70 per cent of the association's members are women from the Iraqi community. This project will deliver sewing classes to 15-20 adult and young women from CaLD backgrounds over eight consecutive weeks from March to May 2022 at the Morley Recreation Centre to achieve several capacity building outcomes, including: sewing and textiles skills development; improving employability; increasing independence; and reducing social isolation by providing a social and support network. | Community Capacity Building |

There will also be a traditional feast and community activities. This will be the first year the Hindu Association of Pilbara are hosting this event as an incorporated group and opening it to the broader community. The targeted program will run for 18 months alongside Ishar's existing prevention and education programs in high schools and client support services, and intends to support 80-100 participants. The funding will engage a project manager to coordinate and a culturally appropriate youth services support worker to provide ongoing services for high schools to support cultural issues such as arranged marriage, FDV and women's rights. | Strategic Projects |
| Ishar Multicultural Women's Health Services Inc | 50,000 | Raising Thriving Children — The program will provide parenting support and education to refugee and migrant mothers and extended female family members with caregiving responsibilities. The program will address the cultural gap and difficulties parents and caregivers face raising their children in an Australian context while maintaining their cultural values. Over a six-month period, RTC will provide 20 evidence-based parenting and communication workshops delivered by external educators tailored to CaLD mothers and 20 evidence-based early childhood learning and development for children aged 0-4 years provided by qualified bi-cultural workers. | Strategic Projects |
| Japan Festival Inc | \$10,000 | Japan Matsuri Festival 2022 — This free annual event aims to showcase contemporary and traditional Japanese culture through a program of stage performances, martial arts demonstrations, Japanese kimono and cosplay parades, information and activity stalls, and at least 25 food stalls. These sessions aim to upskill the members and improve the operations of the organisation and will be organised across three months. | Community Capacity Building |
| Kin Disability Advocacy Inc | \$100,000 | Culturally Responsive Transition Support for CaLD Youth Living with Psycho-Social Disability and their Families — The program has been designed to address a specific systemic gap in support for CaLD youth experiencing mental health issues or living with a disability. The collaborative program provides support for the transition from hospital care to return home by connecting CaLD youth with culturally appropriate services while advocating and providing educational support to the development of an appropriate NDIS plan for ongoing support. There is also provision of support via HelpingMinds to provide support for families/ carers of youth living with mental health issues and disability returning home. The funding will be used to establish an Advisory Committee of experts to provide guidance and oversee the delivery and monitoring of the 18-month project; engage a culturally appropriate youth services Project Officer to work directly with CaLD youth presenting to ED or leaving hospital; and produce a recommendations report for the development and implementation of a best practice model. | Strategic Projects |

Engaging up to 200 participants from targeted migrant backgrounds, the project aims to build the capacity of new migrant communities, particularly those from humanitarian and refugee backgrounds, to participate and contribute to the civic and economic life of Western Australia. The project will engage a training expert and psychologist to prepare community leaders and lead 10 community workshops, targeting 200-250 participants from identified high risk groups including Afghan (Hazara), Kurdish, Middle Eastern (Iran, Syria, Palestinian, Jordan) Filipino (in and around Peel region, Harvey and Bunbury), Indian and Burmese (living in Albany and Katanning). The project aims to inform local African communities about the benefits of COVID-19 vaccinations and increase vaccination rates among the community; address instances of vaccination hesitancy and misconception; build trust around COVID-19 health messaging and vaccinations; and highlight the role of the African community in protecting all Western Australians from COVID-19. The campaign will tailor WA health messaging in African languages and dialects including Swahili, Kinyarwanda, Zulu, Afrikaans, Kirundi, Shona, Ndebele, Dinka, Nuer, Bari, Zande, Arabic, Amharic, Tigrinya, Tigre, Lingala, Sierra Leone Krio, French, Oromo and Somali.
