

01 JEWISH WAR MEMORIAL

Erected in 1920, the Jewish War Memorial honours those Jewish Western Australians who died in World War I. A further plaque was unveiled in 1953 to remember those who lost their lives in WWII.

JAPANESE HYOGO FRIENDSHIP GARDEN

Marking 30 years of the Sister State relationship between Hyogo Prefecture in Japan and Western Australia, the tranquil Hyogo Friendship Garden is a gift from the people of Hyogo.

O3 COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUE: FAIZ AND TAGH MAHOMET

Brothers Faiz and Tagh Mahomet were camel owners and drivers from Afghanistan. Their vital work helped open up the interior of WA in the 1890s before the building of the railway.



COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUE: RABBI DAVID ISAAC FREEDMAN

▲ Rabbi Freedman was the Perth Jewish community's first Rabbi, arriving in 1892. He was an active leader in the community, making the Perth congregation a focus for the approximately 1200 Jews in WA.

(05) HIS MAJESTY'S THEATRE

Building contractor Friederich Gustav Liebe (1862–1950) was born in Wittenberg, Germany. He erected some of Perth's most imposing buildings including His Majesty's Theatre in 1904 and the Peninsula Hotel in Maylands in 1906.

COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUES

Commemorative plaques set into the St Georges Terrace pavement celebrate the lives of Western Australians who have left their mark on WA.

GLEDDEN BUILDING

The Gledden Building (1937) was one of many designs by architect and Jewish community leader Harold Boas, who was also a Perth city councillor and a founder of Temple David.

O7 COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUE: DOM ROSENDO SALVADO

L Dom Salvado was one of a band of Spanish Benedictine missionaries who came to WA in 1846 to evangelise Aboriginal people. He set up the New Norcia mission in 1847.

COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUE: EDIE HOY POY OAM

Edie Hoy Poy OAM was a multicultural leader who spent her life helping Chinese and other migrant communities in Perth.
