Nedlands Local Government Area

According to the 2011 Census, the Nedlands LGA has a total population of 20,534 people:

- 32.7% were born overseas
- 16.7% were born in a non-main English speaking (NMES) country
- **13.4%** speak a language other than English at home.

Ancestry is calculated as:

(Total – Not Stated = Fixed Figure).

Percentages are calculated by dividing each variable by the fixed figure, consistent with ABS methodology.
