- 18.0% were born overseas
- approximately 4.5% were born in a non-main English speaking (NMES) country
- 2.6% speak a language other than English at home.

(Total – Not Stated = Fixed Figure).

Percentages are calculated by dividing each variable by the fixed figure, consistent with ABS methodology.
